#### **SHORT NOTES**

- A team from UK Container Maintenance has triumphed at the annual Masters of Waste Scotland golf tournament, securing the much-coveted first place trophy.
- A new fleet of specialist Fleet Services Ltd waste and recycling vehicles has been delivered to Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council and is already carrying out collections as part of a seamless changeover from the old fleet.
- Greenline Environmental, the London-based 24/7 waste collection and disposal specialists, has invested in a new 26t refuse vehicle, supplied by Refuse Vehicle Solutions Ltd, equipped with bin-weighing to launch its Pay-By-Weight trade refuse service.
- WRAP saw its overall income fall in the last financial year (£20.6m compared to £27.14m the previous year), but the charity continues to operate within budget despite government cuts.
- An initiative in Leeds which will pilot recycling facilities for plastic, cans and paper cups across the city centre was launched in mid-October. The aim is to increase 'on-the-go' recycling by trialling a range of different technologies and methods to get people to recycle their items correctly.
- The Merseyside Recycling & Waste Authority (MRWA) has launched a campaign with Veolia to prevent cardboard from ending up in landfill.

### **Big Investment**

Viridor has confirmed a £3.7 million investment at its Crayford MRF near Dartford to enhanced paper purity and install fire protection systems at the facility, which receives 300,000 tonnes per year of commingled recyclate from 28 local authorities.

#### **Reduced Cost**

The Kent Resource Partnership's (KRP) annual report indicates that the cost of waste managed across 13 councils in Kent fell by £3 million in 2017/18, compared to the previous year.

#### **Praise Indeed**

HDM Engineering Services Ltd have recently fitted a conveyor unit to feed the plastics shredder at Vanden Recycling in Peterborough. HDM have also made new panel systems for existing equipment to make the plant run more efficiently. The company's 'can do' approach to customers has impressed clients.
