Paper Division: Ranjit Baxi new Divisional President

Ranjit Baxi has become the first Asian to be elected a Divisional President of the BIR world recycling body. At the organisation's extremely well attended Autumn Convention in the Polish capital Warsaw, Mr Baxi was approved as the new President of the BIR Paper Division in succession to Dominique Maguin of France who is now the global body's World President.

Mr Baxi's family originated in India but moved to Tanzania, where he was to spend his early years. He relocated to the UK in the early 1970s from where he runs J&H Sales International, a business based near London which specialises in exporting various grades of recovered paper from the UK, Continental Europe and the USA to a host of Asian destinations, including China, India, Taiwan, Thailand, Indonesia, the Philippines, Malaysia, South Korea and

Vietnam. His company earned a major UK accolade in securing a Queen's

Award for Enterprise (International Trade) in 2001.

In his acceptance speech in Warsaw, Mr Baxi described himself as 'honoured'

to have been asked to become President of the BIR Paper Division. He praised

the 'dynamic' leadership of Dominique Maguin who, he said, would be 'a

difficult act to follow'.

Mr Baxi said that, around the world, there was now a greater understanding of

the benefits of recycling, adding that he hoped to take the BIR message to as

many people as possible, particularly in Asia.
