

Scrap runs through my veins.

Simon Isaacs from Panamax Metals is a second generation scrap dealer. He grew up in scrap yards from a young age, and eventually ended up in the business. Here is his story.



When I was young, I'm not sure whether I acknowledged that scrap metal would be my future. I always took an interest in it, as my father, Lee Isaacs, had been trading scrap metal since 1965. With eagerness to learn and a childlike curiosity, I forced my father to take me to scrap yards on my school holidays and any other time I could persuade him to let me miss school (hence why I left at 16). My father showed me the various metals and taught me how to differentiate between them a skill I will always be grateful for.

I found the yards fascinating and understood that this is where I should start if I wanted to fully grasp the role of a scrap metal trader. But like any 16-year-old, I thought I should prove my value and gain work experience in the city.

In the 1990s, I started work at Brewin Dolphin starting in the back office and working my way up to a currency trader. After four years there, I left to take on the role of Senior Trader in small cap shares at City Equities. By 2008, I reached a point in my career where I was looking for another challenge.

My father approached me about joining him in the scrap

business and starting a company together. This was the catalyst I needed to leave my job in the city and start L & P Trading Ltd, an international scrap metal trading company, trading mostly in non-ferrous scrap. During this time we became the purchasing agent for Envirowales Ltd. We bought lead acid batteries, scrap lead, and lead plates; but most importantly, it taught me every aspect of the business from the weigh bridge to the finished product. I even found time to get my qualification as a certified fork lift driver!

In April 2013, we sold L & P Trading and formed Panamax Metals Ltd, to continue our trading of non-ferrous metals internationally. At the same time, I became a father to twins, who keep me very busy. Maybe someday they too will join me in the family business.

Since becoming a member of BIR, I have gained access to a pool of some of the most fascinating and talented people in the scrap arena. I am also proud to say I've already formed friendships that I hope will continue for years to come.

What was it like to attend your first convention? My first BIR convention was

nowhere near as exciting as I had hoped; my first meeting was in Autumn 2008 in Dusseldorf. LME Cu had just dropped some Usd3,000/mt in a little over a month and there was fear that it would go lower still. So it would be fair to say that there was not a lot of optimism in the air at my first BIR convention.

Despite it not being the best markets I however learnt a lot from that convention. I followed closely in the footsteps of my then manager who had a long affiliation with BIR and knew many of the more experienced members. In fact it was at one breakfast that some of his good friends in the industry strongly encouraged me to attend the Young Trader's dinner that evening and to become involved in the BIR YTG.

The main benefit that I have found from being a member of the Young Traders Group is making some very good connections and friends within the group. These are people who I talk to regularly outside of the conferences, sharing ideas and hopefully bettering ourselves.

What was it like to attend your first convention? Rome in 2012 was my first

BIR convention. My instinct is to say it was scary, but actually it was more confusing and overwhelming. Coming from my experience of going to ISRI conferences, I was expecting something similar. What I found was a large group of like-minded people bouncing ideas off each other. This unique experience allowed me to get into my comfort zone which is talking to people and developing relationships. My first BIR convention was in Dubai 2009. A colleague at Uzimet, at that time my employer, decided to leave us and I applied for the job. After having been commercially active, but more on the sales side, for a few years, the scrap world was new for me. So I didn't knew what to expect. But after spending a few days at the BIR convention I was hooked.

It was during this convention that I joined my first Young Traders meeting on the invitation of a nice young gentlemen called Paul Coyte. Who knew then that this was the start of a very good friendship and a new era for the Young Traders Group.

Established in 2001, the BIR Young Traders Group has been fostering the industry leaders of tomorrow alongside the development of a world-wide community of fellow industry peers.

Established in 2001, the BIR Young Traders Group has been fostering the industry leaders of tomorrow alongside the development of a worldwide community of fellow industry peers.

The Young Traders Group was created by BIR so that young executives (those aged 35 years and under) could start to become more involved in the activities of the organisation.

The first meeting of what was then called the Young Executives Committee took place in London in 1995 under the chairmanship of Mitchell Padnos of Louis Padnos Iron & Metal (USA). In 2001, it changed its name to the Young Traders Club and was given fresh

impetus with the broadening of its framework to include regular Young Trader networking evenings during BIR conventions. These dinners gave younger delegates the possibility to get to know each other and network in a more relaxed setting.

In recent years, the YTG has been developing programmes and activities, and is represented on the board of each commodity division. It is a platform for young traders to become part of the wider BIR organisation and become involved in its decision-making.

The YTG continues to grow and look towards the future, providing opportunities for all those interested in becoming involved.
