Seven places to visit in Paris.

Paris offers everything you could possibly want. Experience the many bars, parks, musea, street art, restaurants and much more in the city of romance.



1. Chez Georges

Near the old St-Germain-des-Pres market you will find small streets with enough bars and restaurants to fulfil your gastronomical pleasures. In the middle of these streets you will find a little cave named Chez Georges. Enjoy the lovely wines, the amazing art and the lively atmosphere.

2. The gardens of the Rodin Museum

Scrap's in my blood, suddenly!

How did Lorenzo Geri from Rottami Padana SRL go from being a legal advisor to entering into the exciting world of metal recycling? Read on to here is his story.

Audentes fortuna iuvat. (Fortune favours the bold). This is the best way to begin my story. The first time I visited a metal recycling company I had no idea of what metal scrap was and what it would become for me later. Remembering now that moment I can say: I seized the opportunity.

The odds that I would get into this business were really small. In those days, 2009, I was working in Madrid, as legal advisor. I had to go back to Italy and, I can say, as a pure coincidence, I met Mr. Corrado Zanetti, owner of Rottami Padana Spa company.

We had a little talk where I confessed being bored at work because I was in office all day long. So he said: what do you know about the metal recycling industry? Come to visit me tomorrow, I want to show you my business.

Rottami Padana yard was supplied with all kinds of metals neatly stacked: copper, aluminum, bronze, brass, stainless steel, special alloys. I was surprised about everything I could see around me. Cuttings, turnings, plates, metals from every kind of production discard, automotive scraps and wheels, wires, granulates.

I started wondering aloud: where does all this metal come from? What are they going to do with it? Mr. Zanetti intrigued me and offered to teach me a more exciting job.

I decided to seize the opportunity and I said yes. I didn't know where he was leading me.

When I began I started at the yard: I needed to understand the different types of metals, the alloys and most importantly their industrial application. For trading metals you need to know where they are used and how they are processed throughout the manufacturing process. Half of my time on those days I was going with my colleague Riccardo Cremonesi, visiting partners and attending meetings around Italy.

One year later, Mr. Zanetti decided to send me to France to strengthen the presence of the company in the market and since that time I never stopped travelling. I've been learning, excited, the fine negotiation techniques to carry on an international trading business, facing difficulties and



troubles. Finally my language skills helped me to get new suppliers and friends all around the world.

Rottami Padana Spa is a big family and they adopted me, literally. I can't thank them enough. Entering a new business is not easy if you are an "outsider". However, if at your side you can count on smart and brilliant people, as I met in Rottami Padana, it's just much more easy.

I've always loved challenges: the bigger they are, the bigger is my commitment! I want to keep on exploring this world, getting more and more experience.

To be a member of the BIR Young Traders Group is very important to me. You can compare your experience, exchanging views with other young people about not just business. First times at BIR people are shy and disoriented. YGT helps young traders to feel comfortable and gives them the opportunity to meet new talented partners! I exhort therefore all to participate and to promote the group.

Spotlight on a Young Trader.

Paul Coyte of Hayes Metals Group shares with us his career's twists and turns to date.

My Great-Grandfather Fred Hayes, the founder of Hayes Metals, moved to New Zealand after World War One. Fred Hayes fought on the front line during the war and when he got back to the docks in England any returned serviceman had the right of free passage to anywhere within the Commonwealth. Fred decided there and then, that with the challenging economic outlook in Britain, and any risk of having to fight in another world war, that he wanted to be as far away from the UK as possible. The day he arrived back in the UK he asked where the furthest place from England was that spoke English, the reply was New Zealand. He booked a passage for the following day. He arrived in New Zealand and started working on the railroads. Seeing piles of scrap accumulating as the railroads were being built, and not wanting to make a career in the rail industry, he challenged fellow workers to boxing matches during his lunch break and it was the money he won from these fights which was used to establish Hayes Metals.

Hayes Metals is now a fourth-generation, family-owned company producing copper based ingots in New Zealand and aluminium and zinc based ingots in Australia. Established in 1927, Hayes Metals is the largest producer of copper-based ingots in Australasia. I am a fourth-generation family member and in charge of international trade.

I have been involved in BIR since 2006 and from the first meeting started attending Young Traders Events. Being a part of this group gave me a huge number of contacts and also friends. The Young Traders Group is a fantastic group and I found people who were genuinely interested in helping each other succeed, which has had huge flow-on effects to Hayes and has helped me grow the company. A testament to this is the number of BIR members (many of which are young traders) that were invited to attend my wedding earlier this year.

Being part of the Young Traders Group gave me the opportunity to become involved within the BIR. The general rule is that the more you become involved the more you benefit from your involvement, and being involved in the BIR has been a real opportunity for personal growth. Through the Young Traders Group



I became involved in the Non-Ferrous Board, and am now the General Delegate. I was able to join the Membership Committee and am the Vice Chairman. I also became a member of the Nominations Committee. A brief history of the Young Traders Group.

Established in 2001, the BIR Young Traders Group has been fostering the industry leaders of tomorrow alongside the development of a world-wide community of fellow industry peers.

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The Young Traders Group was created by BIR so that young executives (those aged 35 years and under) could start to become more involved in the activities of the organisation.

The first meeting of what was then called the Young Executives Committee took place in London in 1995 under the chairmanship of Mitchell Padnos of Louis Padnos Iron & Metal (USA). In 2001, it changed its name to the Young Traders Club and was given fresh

impetus with the broadening of its framework to include regular Young Trader networking evenings during BIR conventions. These dinners gave younger delegates the possibility to get to know each other and network in a more relaxed setting.

In recent years, the YTG has been developing programmes and activities, and is represented on the board of each commodity division. It is a platform for young traders to become part of the wider BIR organisation and become involved in its decision-making.

The YTG continues to grow and look towards the future, providing opportunities for all those interested in becoming involved.
